TEACHING EXPERIENCE

English 245: The Book as Object
An introduction to the history of the book and media theory, focused on the materiality of
text across periods.
English 345: Forms of Presence in Renaissance Lyric
An introduction to early modern lyric poetry, with a focus on the idea of poetic immediacy. Readings of Wyatt, Sidney, Donne, Wroth, Herbert, Marvell and others supplemented with readings in lyric theory and the history of the book.
English 154: Maps, Globes, Moons: Renaissance Worldmaking
A first-year seminar, with a focus on academic writing, that examines the changing idea of "world" in early modern Europe—and the changes practices of "worldmaking"—in the context of New World colonization, scientific discovery, and utopian thinking.

An introduction to Shakespearean drama, complemented by important plays by Shakespeare's contemporaries and organized by a focus on drama as a mode of skepticism.

A survey of Shakespeare's plays encompassing all dramatic genres. Plays include As You Like It, I Henry IV, King Lear, Macbeth, and The Winter's Tale.
